- Evidence based (Bogenschneider, K., Little, O. M., Ooms, T., Benning, S., Cadigan, K., & Corbett, T. 2012, Wong, 2020;
- Mixed method
- Relational (relational impact analysis unit)
- Reflective lever to rethink social services and interventions in terms of justice and equitable wellbeing (family flourishing, Theory of Change)






# The Multifaceted FamILens Project Data on the validation of Family Impact Checklists

# The Project Multifaceted FamILens Family Impact Analysis con le checklist (WP4)




- 1. Content validity: Methodological review on items
- 2. Definition of structural variables to be added to the questionnaire
- 3. Selection of any measurement scales on constructs that you want to associate with the dimensions of the checklist
- 4. Façade validity: Preparation for pilot administration of the complete questionnaire to targets who had not participated in WP2 and WP3
- 5. Insertion of changes to the questionnaire following the pilot
- 6. Administration (Sampling, privacy, filters, control questions)
- 7. Calculation of final scores of the principles
- 3. Structure analysis (exploratory and confirmatory factor analyses)
- 9. Items analysis (missing, otuliers, distribution)
- 10. Multivariate Analysis
- 11. Implementation of checklists on the IT platform

## Participation in the Family Impact Evaluation

	Strengths / Opportunities	Weaknesses / Criticalities
Onboarding	Autonomy, accessibility, and clarity for those familiar with the processes and framework	Risk of disorientation for those who are less familiar, objectives and roles that are not always clear
Selection of particpants	Variety of approaches and experiences, participation on a voluntary basis	Selection effect; doubts about the democratic nature of the process
Dropout	Possibility to observe dynamics of participation and commitment over time	Abandonment of participants, reduced representativeness throughout the process
Digital research	Geographical accessibility, flexibility of time and use of collaborative tools (Teams, OneDrive, Jamboard)	
Multivision	Enrichment of perspectives, multifaceted reading of services	Difficulties of synthesis and mediation, shared language to be built



## Target of the family impact evaluation

**More tools:** For effective assessment, it is useful to use diversified tools to grasp the complexity of interventions on family systems.

**Multiple informant:** This means the collection of data from multiple points of view: not only from a single operator or beneficiary, but from different actors involved (operators with different roles, family members, project referents, etc.). It would be essential to understand how the service/intervention is perceived from within the family itself, not only from the operators.

**Specificity of points of view:** Operators evaluate different things: each operator has access and control over only some dimensions of the intervention (e.g. an educator sees relational aspects, an administrative one sees organizational ones). In addition, not all operators have the same possibilities of intervention (maneuver), and this also influences their perception of the impact.



## Mixed method integration and validity of the Family Impact Evaluation

- Principle adaptation: theory → experts → practitioners
- Previous assessment tools: guidelines, grids, operator instruments (when present)
- Structural analysis: item coherence, subdimensions, associations, regional/target differences
- Operationalization & refinement: clarify wording, reassign/move items, split doublemeaning items, delete/revise where needed

#### Conclusions and continuity

- Good resilience of the evaluation model and its adaptation and integration
- Innovative and articulated research design for the first family impact analyses big project involving professionals throughout all Italy
- Challenging standards and non-standards in 4 heterogeneous contexts
- This think family perspective helps to overcome fragmentation and standardization, restoring centrality to the relational and dialogical dimension of local welfare.
